Notes

Saetaryung (Bird Song), an orally transmitted Korean folk tune with a pentatonic melody, is set here in B harmonic minor. The melody is harmonized with a constant fast eigth note ostinato.

Arirang, the best known Korean folk tune used for all occasions regardless of its original meaning, malediction on a departing lover, is set in the form of theme and variation with a short introduction. In each variation the melody undergoes changes in key, harmony, meter, register, and texture.

The Sacred Sonata, a project under the Presidential Scholar Fellowship, has no particular form and annotates the text, a synopsis of the Bible and the statement of my Christian faith. It is intended for use, in whole or in part, for offertory and other special music at local churches.

The Cantata, another project under the Presidential Scholar Fellowship, is modeled after Bach's cantatas in length, orchestration, subject matter, and musical style. Though set in tonal language familiar to most churches, the composition injects elements of jazz and popular rhythm and harmony. The libretto is a collage of Bible verses.

Libretto for the Cantata

Namyoung Pak

Born in Korea, Namyoung immigrated to the US in 1987. She started accompanying a choir at age 11 and has been music director and organist for over 20 years at churches, including Cornerstone United Methodist Church, Fullerton, CA, where she served last before coming to Hunter College. She has also been accompanist for the Honolulu Gleemen, Honolulu Children's Opera Chorus, and Levite Choir, which has performed throughout the US, Canada, and Korea, including the National Theater in Seoul. It was in 1993 when she first met the Fishers, a Christian contemporary band based in Southern California for which she was songwriter and vocalist, that she realized her call to composition. Published by Seoul's Yaymoonsa, the recordings of her songs have been performed widely. One song, Lift Up Your Eyes, has won the Gold Prize in the 1993 Gospel Song Fesitval sponsored by the Korean Broadcasting Company of Los Angeles. She began serious composition studies in the spring of 1997 for her MA in music under Dr. Shafer Mahoney and Dr. Walter Hilse. At Hunter she has won numerous scholarships and awards: Presidential Scholar Fellowship, Victoria Miss Bitterman Prize, Blanche Saia Graduate Fellowship, Adele Steinhauer-Mullins Scholarship, Castle Memorial Graduate Fellowship, Charlotte W. Newcombe Foundation Scholarship, and Juliet S. Saunders Scholarship.

Kenji Bunch (viola), a Juilliard graduate, performs with the Flux, Continuum, Craftsbury Chamber Players, and Orpheus Chamber Orchestra. Also a composer, his compositions have been performed by the English Chamber Orchestra, New Juilliard Ensemble, Ahn Trio, Omaha Symphony, Bridgehampton Festival, and percussionist Daniel Druckman. A CD of his *Fantasy* for violin and orchestra featuring violist Ittai Shapira and the English Chamber Orchestra will be available early this coming fall.

Jeanmarie Harrison (soprano), a student at Hunter College, has participated in many ensemble and solo performances at Hunter with the Jazz Vocal Workshop, Collegium Musicum, and *Dido and Aeneas*.

Hyun-Ju Jo (clarinet), a Juilliard graduate, has performed as soloist with the 92nd Street Y Workshop Orchestra at Kauffman Hall, Korean Festival Orchestra, Daegu Symphony Orchestra, MBC TV, and at other recitals in Korea and New York.

Michael Min (baritone), an NTSU/AMDA graduate, has sung in numerous musicals and on TV including As The World Turns, The City, New York Undercover, Making Tracks (Taipei Theatre), King & I (Struthers Library Theatre), Shanghai Lil's (Pan Asian Rep), You Can't Take It With You (NATCO), Funny Girl, Singin' In The Rain (Carousel Dinner Theatre), Secret Garden, and Swiss Family Robinson (Theaterworks/USA).

Andrew Pak (violin and piano), an MIT freshman and First Place winner of the 1997 NYSTA competition, is the featured piano soloist with the MIT Symphony Orchestra for the 1999-2000 season.

Woody Pak (guitar), an MIT/Juilliard graduate, has numerous film and TV scores, musicals including *Making Tracks* (1999, Taipei Theater) and *Miss Monday*, and songs such as *Found a Cure* (1998), sung by Ultra Naté, climbing up the pop charts worldwide.

Jonas Tauber (cello) has performed with the Lumina Quartet and Hengrave Quartet, pianist Albert Lotto, guitarist Hans Tammen, and singers Sarah Hudson and Vanessa Falabella. Currently he is creating his own sound with a band comprised of Tabla, Viola da Gamba, two cellos, guitar, and trumpet.

Brandon Vazquez (trumpet), a Hunter student, is winner of the Bloomingdale and Hunter College Orchestra concerto competitions.

Welly Yang (tenor), a Columbia graduate, has played Thuy in Broadway's Miss Saigon, Aladdin in the East Asian tour of Cole Porter's Aladdin, Whizzer in NATCO's Falsettoland, a civil rights attorney in John Adam's/Peter Sellar's Ceiling/Sky at Lincoln Center and in Europe, in Making Tracks (Taipei Theatre), Ghostwriter (PBS), TV commercials, and films like An Argentine in New York and Fallen Nest.
